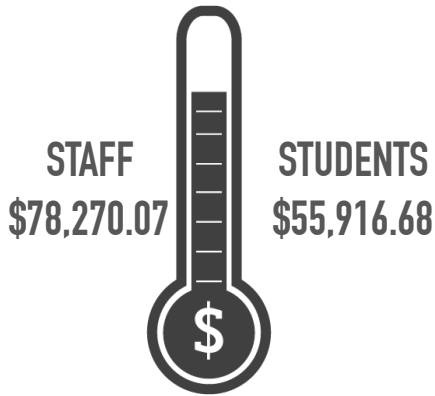

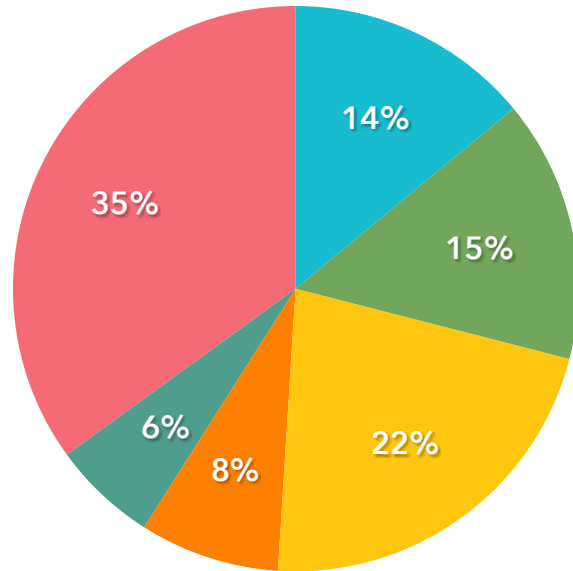


TOTAL RAISED

2014-2015 was a year of firsts for Global Leaders. After their year of service and leadership, 6 students traveled on GL's maiden journey to Ghana. In the Ashanti communities of Besease, Sepaase, and Kumasi, they worked in an orphanage, on a small farm, and built a library to fill with donated books for local school children. Students made time to immerse themselves in the culture, savoring local recipes like fufu, and learning to drum and dance. GL plans to increase the group size on the Ghana journey in 2016.

In Colorado, students, led by junior Julia S., organized the inaugural Shoe Run 5k race to benefit school children in Guatemala through donations of shoes. Planned during the pre-journey leadership retreat, the 5k was completed by over 50 students, staff, and community members, and resulted in the donation of over 600 pairs of shoes.

In California, the growing Executive board, now 12 members strong, took greater responsibility for team-building, service project planning and fundraising, leading to nearly double student fundraising, and new partnerships with agencies like the Surfriders' Foundation, the Veterans Association, and Habitat for Humanity.
